Chairman's Cable





O Wherefore Art Thou My Wrenchy Petrol-Besotted Muse

Sometimes dear reader, your Chairman and thy humble servant must confess, he doth have naught to say and finds himself at a total loss of words, nay possesseth he neither thought nor idea for your Cable. So, he reads for inspiration the BBC news, The Telegraph, The Mirror, The Globe and Mail, and other sources from the Mother Country. From such erudite sources we learn that the month of April 2016 marked two noteworthy and

significant anniversaries that ought be celebrated by all English-speaking peoples and loyal British colonists (or at least those of us who love LBC's). First, the longest reigning monarch in British history, Her Majesty

Queen Elizabeth celebrated her 90th Birthday (b. April 21, 1926). And, April 23rd, 2016 commemorates 400 years since the death of the world famous playwright, William Shakespeare and marks his 452nd birthday (born April 23, 1564; died April 23, 1616). Why you may ask is this of *any* relevance to our little MG's and (for some of us) our obsessive love affair with British automobiles? Frankly, it's not. But here, dear audience, I ask only for that fleeting "willing suspension of disbelief," that you may better enjoy the show.

¹ The term willing suspension of disbelief has been defined as a willingness to suspend one's critical faculties and believe the unbelievable: sacrifice of realism and logic for the sake of enjoyment. The term was coined in 1817 by the poet and aesthetic philosopher Samuel Taylor Coleridge, who suggested that if a writer could infuse a "human interest and a semblance of truth" into a fantastic tale, the reader would suspend judgment concerning the implausibility of the narrative. The phrase "suspension of disbelief" came to be used more loosely in the later 20th century, often used to imply that the burden was on the reader, rather than the writer, to achieve it. Coleridge recalled: "... It was agreed, that my endeavours should be directed to persons and characters supernatural, or at least romantic, yet so as to transfer from our inward nature a human interest and a semblance of truth sufficient to procure for these shadows of imagination that willing suspension of disbelief for the moment, which constitutes poetic faith. Mr. Wordsworth on the other hand was to propose to himself as his object, to give the charm of novelty to things of every day, and to excite a feeling analogous to the supernatural, by awakening the mind's attention from the lethargy of custom, and directing it to the loveliness and the wonders of the world before us ..." [Coleridge, Biographia Literaria, 1817, Chapter XIVI.





The Royals have enjoyed a fine collection of British cars over the years, including among others, Prince Charles' MGB GT, modern Jaguar XJ Saloons, a handsome Rover P5B, but perhaps none more so than the Queen herself and her girl-like joy of driving her Land Rovers, yes by herself, piloting those primitive agricultural trucks with their non-synchromanual transmissions, especially around the 50,000-acre estate surrounding her beloved Balmoral Castle in Scotland.

"Philip enjoys driving and does it fast! He has his own tiny M.G which he is very proud of – he has taken me about in it, once up to London, which was great fun, only it was like sitting on the road, and the wheels are almost as high as one's head."



But what of, The Bard of Avon? What possible connection could the great poet have to British cars? Would he even appreciate our magical little British chariots had say, an MG TC, been available to one of his tragic or heroic characters, to zoom Hamlet's Ghost across the stage of the famous Globe Theatre, 'deus ex machina' "god from the machine." Directions:

From North or South via I-93 & NH 101E

I-93 until merging onto NH 101E (Exit 7, Follow signs for Portsmouth/Seacoast). Take exit 3 off of NH 101E (Candia/Deerfield). Right turn at the end of the exit onto Route 43N. Route 43N will turn left at a blinking light...continue straight at the blinking light. You will join route 27 after a sweeping right turn...continue east on route 27 (Raymond Rd)...you will pass Candia Courthouse & Car World on your left. Historic Motor Sports is past Car World on your left, directly opposite a Mobile Gas Station.

From the North or South via I-95 & NH 101W

I-95 to exit for NH 101W (Exit 2 Exeter/Hampton) Take exit 3 off of NH 101W (Candia/Deerfield)...follow directions above from Exit 3.


From the North via NH 4 & Route 43S

NH 4 (1st NH Turnpike) to Northwood.. Turn right (if traveling east) or left (if traveling west) at the blinking light intersection with Route 43S. Follow Route 43S through Deerfield into Candia. Route 43S intersects Route 27E at a traffic light in Candia...turn left at the light onto Route 27E. You will pass Candia Courthouse & Car World on your left. Historic Motor Sports is on the left past Car World opposite a Mobil gas Station.



Double Drop fermentation makes Brakspear Bitter unique

Double Dropping, also known as the Dropping System of fermentation, was for the first half of the 20th Century the most popular method for the fermentation of traditional English Ales.

It involves starting fermentation of the wort (fermentable liquid rich in malted barley's sugars) in one vessel, followed by "dropping" this liquid under gravity into a second vessel below it, usually on the second day of fermentation. Here it continues its fermentation for two or three days. The beer is then slowly cooled over the next couple of days, during which time it matures and gains complexity.

As breweries were modernized, or taken over and closed, the Double Drop method quietly went out of fashion, almost disappearing by the end of the century.

The system has two main beneficial effects:

- purifying of the partially fermented beer, by leaving behind protein deposits and spent yeasts which can cause 'off' flavors in the final beer.
- aeration of the wort causing a surge in yeast growth, which develops the special delicate butterscotch flavors for which Brakspear Bitter is acclaimed.

Whilst modern technology can imitate both these effects, the Double Drop system does it naturally by the use of gravity. Also, as the vessels are fixed, the effect is entirely consistent from brew to brew.

Brakspear's at Henley was one of the last established traditional brewers in the UK to use this Double Drop method for production of its regular brews. Six of the original Brakspear Double Drop vessels and the two primary fermenters have been installed in their own dedicated Brakspear fermenting room, within the Wychwood brewery in Witney, and there, Brakspear beers are being Double Dropped once again.
